## 3. Key Findings (Summary)

- Multiple studies emphasize the importance of early referral and symptom-based evaluation when imaging is inconclusive.

## 4. Literature Review

### A. Diagnostic Delay

Several large-scale studies report prolonged intervals between symptom onset and formal diagnosis.

Authors note that patients frequently present with symptoms for years before laparoscopy or specialist referral is considered.

### B. Diagnostic Challenges

- Imaging sensitivity varies widely
